
A HIGH HOLIDAY MEDITATION SERVICE

Please join us as Rabbi Perkins' Monday morning weekly Talmud class continues. Our overall theme this year will be "Living in Community," which the Talmud explores in a wide-ranging manner.

For example, here are some philosophical issues we'll explore:

- o *If "good fences make good neighbors", what is a "good fence"?
- *Are there any ethical challenges of living in a gated community? If so, what might they be?

And here are some practical ones:

- *How long do you have to live in a community before it is reasonable to be considered a "resident," responsible for paying taxes and supporting the poor?
- *Speaking of supporting the poor: Should begging door-to-door be encouraged or discouraged?
- *Should yeshiva students be obliged to share responsibility for protecting the community? Why or why not?

Prayer is an ancient art that requires preparation, musicality, and discernment. The Michael Sockol Jewish Writers Fund, in partnership with Temple Aliyah's Social Action Committee and Temple Beth Shalom's Adult Learning, will present noted professor, author, and columnist, Noah Feldman.

<u>In</u> his just-published book, **To Be a Jew Today**, Mr. Feldman examines contemporary Judaism and how Jews can and should make sense of their tradition — and each other. What does it mean to be a Jew? At a time of worldwide crisis, meaningful answers to this question have become unsettled. In his book, Mr. Feldman draws on his lifelong religious engagement to offer a wide-ranging interpretation of Judaism and its various movements. How do Jews today understand their relationship to God, to Israel, and to each other—and live their lives accordingly?

Writing sympathetically but incisively about a diversity of outlooks, Mr. Feldman discusses the shared "theology of struggle" that all Jews engage in as they wrestle with whether God exists, who God is, and what God

wants. He also shows how the founding of Israel has transformed Judaism itself - and explores the current, ongoing consequences of that transformation.

We live in stressful times. Anxiety, depression, and mental health issues are on the rise for all age groups throughout society. In his presentation, sponsored by the TA Mental Health Initiative, Dr. Brooks will discuss realistic strategies for nurturing resilience in ourselves as well as in others. THE TEN COMMANDMENTS: A DEEP DIVE IN THREE PARTS

Sundays: November17, January 12, April 6, 10 to 11:30 am

The Ten Commandments, called the Ten Utterances and The Tablets of the Covenant in Jewish tradition, and The Decalogue by scholars, has recently taken a prominent place in American political and ideological discourse, due to new policies in states such as Tennessee mandating the text's placement in classrooms and other public spaces. The 3-session mini course takes an immersive look at the important and well-known Biblical passage, both as a whole, and with respect to its component parts. The course is designed in order that members may attend it in its entirety or choose individual sessions.

Session 1: Big Picture

We will look at the unit as a whole, taken in its Torah context, and analyzed with respect to Biblical and Ancient Near Eastern law and rhetoric. We will also compare the versions found in Exodus 20 and Deuteronomy 5. Session 2: Ritual and the Sacred

We will study the theology of The Decalogue, wrestle with the related concepts of Idolatry and Adultery, and take a deep dive into the Shabbat Commandment.

Session 3: Civil Law

Our focus will be on the Murder, Theft and Testimony commandments and we will unpack the imperative to honor parents.

THE ABRAHAM INITIATIVES The Abraham Initiatives promotes Jewish-Arab partnership across all facets of Israeli society. The organization's goal is to fulfill the promise of full and equal citizenship and complete equality of social and political rights for Israel's Jewish and Arab citizens. Its leadership team reflects the values of the organization and is comprised of Jews and Arabs from across Israel, all with significant expertise in building Jewish-Arab relations.

DEBORAH BEN ADERET ♦ Deborah and her family were eyewitnesses to the horror of October 7, 2023. They lived on Kibbutz Zikim, about two miles north of the Gaza border, until October 8, 2023. Hiding in their safe room, her family survived the horrific events only because the small kibbutz security team succeeded in keeping Hamas out of the kibbutz when they tried to infiltrate. Deborah and her family were evacuated on October 8th to a hotel in Jerusalem. Her family lived there until she decided to bring her girls with her to Highland Park on Oct. 25th. Her goal now while living in the States is to use her personal experiences to educate people about the realities in Israel and the truth about.

DR. EILEEN ANGELINI, PhD

Dr. Angelini is an award-winning scholar of French studies. She received her B.A. in French from Middlebury College and her M.A. and Ph.D. in French Studies from Brown University. She was also awarded Canada-U.S. Fulbright Her work with Holocaust survivors and documenting the events of the WWII Occupation of France was recognized by the French Government with the award of Chevalier dans l'Ordre des Palmes Académiques, an honor for devotion and accomplishment in the realm of teaching.

DAVID BERNAT, PhD ◈ David Bernat has been a Temple Aliyah member since 2008 and served a term on the board as Adult Education chair. He has a PhD from Brandeis in Biblical Studies and Jewish Antiquity, with research and publications in the areas of ritual, as well as violence and religious zealotry. Bernat has held faculty positions at Wellesley College, Hebrew College Rabbinical School, and UMass Amherst. Dollinger was named the volunteer of the year in 2008 by the Jewish Community Federation of San Francisco. In 2015, the Jewish Community Relations Council awarded him the year's Courageous Leader for his work at SF State, a sometimes-hostile campus for Jews. He has appeared in a PBS television show, American Jerusalem, offering insights into the history of San Francisco Jews, and then enjoyed 8 minutes of fame on NBC's prime-time "Who Do You Think You Are?" teaching academy-award winning actress Helen Hunt about her San Francisco Jewish roots.

Dollinger is the author of "Black Power, Jewish Politics: Reinventing the Alliance in the 1960's," "American Jewish History," "Quest for Inclusion" and "California Jews."

KAREN FARBMAN ◈ Karen grew up in Cincinnati and spent many summers at Goldman Union Camp in Zionsville, Indiana, both as camper and on staff, where she fell in love with Jewish summer camp. Karen worked at Boston Children's Hospital as an attending in Pediatric Emergency Medicine focusing on clinical excellence, staffing its Emergency Department and network hospitals, and training Harvard Medical School fellows, residents, and medical students. She also authored guidelines for Pediatric Emergency Medicine management of anaphylaxis and published on this topic.

Karen and her husband David joined Temple Aliyah in 2007 with their three children. When their oldest, Emily, was ready for overnight camp in 2005, Karen decided to volunteer to be one of the doctors at Camp Ramah in New England's for Emily's last week at camp. NOAH FELDMAN ♦ Noah Feldman is the Felix Frankfurter Professor of Law and founding director of the Julis-Rabinowitz Program on Jewish and Israeli Law at Harvard University. He is an adjunct senior fellow at the Council on Foreign Relations and in 2003 advised the coalition provisional authority in its drafting of a new Iraqi constitution.
